

Large Gilt Bronze Figure of an Immortal

Taoism, a set of beliefs
originating in ancient China and
containing both religious and
philosophical elements, has been the
subject of innumerable examples of
Chinese art over the millennia. Some of
the most popular of these artworks
depict the Eight Immortals, former poor



or working-class people who, after being subjected to difficult conditions, were rewarded for their perseverance by the various gods popular at the time. These works highlight the Taoist virtues of compassion, frugality, and humanity, each of which a common religious virtue the world over, and are beautiful artworks. of an Immortal (\$2/3,000) is a

sculpture of a Taoist Immortal Li

Tieguai, dressed in flowing robes,

leaning on his crutch. Li Tieguai is
depicted as a thin, frail figure, with a
long crutch that supports his weight.
Beneath his robe, he wears sandals and
firmly grips his crutch with both hands
to support his weight, while the crutch
winds around his right leg and
eventually extends behind his back,
providing a sort of chair. He has a long,
flowing beard connected to an upward
twisted mustache, both of which
contrasts sharply with his bald head. Li
Tieguai's face is defined by a sharp brow
line, accentuated by a thin headband
and a stoic expression.

Li Tieguai is one of the most

popular of the Taoist Eight Immortals

and one of the most widely known

Chinese mythological figures. As one of
the Eight Immortals, Li Tieguai exists

somewhere between Western

conceptions of deity, folk hero, and
saint, and there are a significant number

of shrines dedicated to him throughout
China. Similar to Greek mythology, the
Eight Immortals are believed to live on a
mountain, Mount Penglai, a legendary
location supposed to exist somewhere in
the sea between China and the Korean
peninsula, which is described as a
religious utopia.

While Li Tieguai is often
described as being irritable, his wide
popularity stems from his practice of
providing divine medicine and other
forms of support to the poor and
downtrodden. Appearing as a beggar, Li
Tieguai is usually depicted with his
magical gourd, which dispenses an
endless supply of medicine capable of
treating any illness, and his iron crutch.
In fact, his name, which translates
literally as "Iron Crutch Li," is derived
from this iconographic emblem, which
he must use due to a chronic leg injury.

Li Tieguai, like most of the Immortals, was a common person who acted with grace and humility while being subjected to unusual and unfair events, causing the gods to bestow them with divine status. Before becoming immortal, Li Tieguai was said to have practiced extreme religious devotion, often neither eating or sleeping for long periods, and living in a cave. After becoming immortal and taking the body of a destitute beggar who had just died of starvation, Li Tieguai was given his magical gourd full of medicine and was tasked with traveling from town to town, healing the sick and uplifting the persecuted. For this reason, his iron cane is sometimes featured outside traditional Chinese apothecaries and some devout Taoists frequently seek out his blessing through the Taoist priesthood.

Large Gilt Bronze Figure of
an Immortal (\$2/3,000) will be
offered at Michaan's Auctions January
Gallery Auction on Friday, January 19th,
which features numerous cars in
excellent condition in addition to fine
examples from the Fine Art and Asian
Art departments. The auction is led by a
2023 Tesla Model X in Plaid Trim with
only 3,901 miles, a 1966 Ford Mustang
Hardtop Coupe, as well as a 1955 Ford
Thunderbird. Also included is a painting
attributed to George Knapton, a notable
oil painting by Joseph Henry Sharp, and
a 14k yellow gold charm bracelet.

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
