Experimentation is an essential part of the artist's process, but these experiments are rarely allowed to leave the artist's studio. These processes of trial and error offer a unique insight into the mind of the artist and the progression of their ideas, making these works are highly valued for both their historical significance and rarity.

Michaan's Auctions is proud to offer one such work, Marvin Bentley Lipofsky, California Sketch, glass

(\$2,5/3,500) for sale in our March Gallery Auction, held on Friday, March 15th.

This glass work consists of thinly blown glass formed into a sphere, which has been allowed to partially collapse and split open. This partial settling of the glass creates three folds which
decrease the circumference of the sphere
as it extends towards the top of the
form. On one side is an opening that
takes the form of a misshapen oval and
allows the viewer access to the
translucent interior, which mirrors the
folds and shapes evident from the
exterior. The glass consists largely of
this translucent white glass mixed with
purple towards the base of the object,



and green is used primarily as spots on the surface of the form. There are a few small spots of brown and blue, as well as some blending of the green spots into the base of white glass near the opening.



Lipofsky is both interested in the recreation of organic forms and the distortions of traditional glass-making forms, a dual interest evident in this work. The broken bubble evident in this work is a motif typical of the artist, it represents a variation to the most basic of glass-blowing forms, thereby bringing the materiality of glass to the forefront of the viewer's perception. The use of

translucent glass and openings allows
the viewer to see inside the art and
works to complicate traditional
delineations between interior and
exterior in the medium. The allusion to
natural forms, in this case seashells,
complicates the artist's interest in glassmaking techniques, revealing a
sophisticated understanding of the
nature of artistic forms.

As detailed by our consigner and appraiser, this piece is likely a sketch for one of the artist's most celebrated works, his California Storm series. This collection, consisting of at least thirty-three objects, was made during his tenure at the California College of the Arts in the Bay Area in the early 1980s. Like many of his other works, these objects are small, highly colorful works in glass that appear somewhere between organic and artificial. While Lipofsky's works frequently resemble seashells, he

pushes these forms beyond naturalism towards creations that are best described as fantastic. These experiments are combined with the artist's interests in the gestures and forms inherent to the glassblowing process, creating complicated works that evade simplistic interpretation.



Marvin Bentley Lipofsky was an American glass artist born in Elgin, Illinois in September 1938. He studied industrial design at the University of Illinois before becoming one of the inaugural students at the University of Wisconsin-Madison glass program.

American Studio Glass Movement,
Harvey Littleton, Lipofsky spread its
ideas to the West Coast during his time
teaching at UC Berkeley and later the
California College of Arts and Crafts,
where he founded the glass program.
During these years, he continued to
spread the tenants of the movement by
frequently teaching workshops across
the country, as well as in Europe, Japan,
and Israel. His work is widely collected
by prominent museums and private
collectors from around the world.
