

## Armin Carl Hansen, "Sardine Barge," Etching on Handmade Paper.



It is always a pleasure to offer works from local artists, especially when they come from Alameda. Such is the case with Armin Carl Hansen, a renowned painter of marine scenes who was raised on the island and later

attended school in San Francisco.

The etching consists of a small sardine barge, tied up to the docks in an uncertain location. The barge takes up

the center of the frame, with a dock visible alongside the very right side of the frame, while the rest of the image consists of gently swelling water. The viewer looks down from the docks onto the barge, where two men stand at the helm. To their right is a man standing in the sea, with waterproof boots extending

nearly to his waist, affixing a rope to the rear of the barge. Behind the barge is a dingy, which contains a man with a long oar attempting to cast off towards the sea behind him. The barge is tied, both to the pier and an unseen object to the right of the frame, through a ring affixed to its bow. It casts a dark shadow that extends toward the viewer, disrupting the artist's rendering of the lazily undulating ocean.

In its choice of subject matter and location, this work centers the realities of working people in the fishing industries. In contrast to works that highlight the freedom of the ship on an open ocean, we are invited to view men pushing through thick mud to cast off under the hot sun, which casts deep shadows across the water's surface. The pier's utilitarian construction and long ropes further highlight the connection to industry, which provides the basis for

ships to be at sea in most artworks, although it is rarely acknowledged.

This work is highly characteristic of Hansen's work, particularly in its choice of marine subject matter. Hansen was a prolific painter of marine scenes, typically with a focus on shifting light and its interaction with the water's surface. However, this work is a departure in the choice of medium, as Hansen is primarily known for his oil works, and in his focus on industry in this print, which greatly differs from his usual interest in boats far from the shore and unencumbered by the necessities of life on land. This is made even more evident by the lack of color, choosing instead to emphasize the rough surfaces of the boat, pier, and ropes, at the expense of a more luxurious rendering of light. The movement of the ocean's surface is also accentuated in this medium, with thin wandering lines

rendering the ever-changing surface with amazing detail.

Armin Carl Hansen was born in San Francisco, California in 1886 before moving with his family to Alameda at the age of five. His father taught him the basics of drawing and watercolors, and Hansen was inspired to attend the Mark Hopkins Institute, the predecessor of the recently shuttered San Francisco Art Institute. Following credible accusations of assault on a fellow student, in addition to the 1906 earthquake, Hansen fled the country for Germany, where he studied in Stuttgart and Munich. It was during this time that he worked on numerous commercial ships and traveled widely throughout European capitals. In 1912 he returned to the United States, eventually settling in Monterey, where he continued to teach and exhibit widely before his death in 1957.
